From the Principal

Dear Parents and Carers,

Each year I look forward to attending the Year 6 camp. It is a wonderful opportunity to spend some quality time with our student leaders before they depart our school and start new adventures in high school. At our school, we value the opportunity for our students to experience outdoor programs. During their school years 3 – 6, our students are able to attend four camp experiences with a range of outdoor activities on offer. At this camp, our Year 6 students were able to learn to surf, tackle the hills on mountain bikes, build and race billy carts, work together to design & build a raft that could float and to develop their kayaking skills on a lake. This is just a small sample of what our students can experience, however the development of many other skills contribute to their own personal growth and enable them to interact effectively and harmoniously. School camps are a liberating way for students to interact with the natural world while learning a range of life skills.

The benefits of a good outdoor program include: opportunities for peer bonding, being physically active, the freedom to be responsible, screen-free time, being exposed to new experiences and simply spending time in nature. Our school camps provide these experiences beyond the classroom to give our students the opportunity to interact with their teachers and peers in new environments and, most importantly, to have fun.

Class Structures

I would like to take this opportunity to share with the school community our class structures for 2025.

We will start the year with 10 classes which will include:

2025

- 2 Classes of Reception
- 2 Classes of Year 1
- 2 Classes of Year 2
- 2 Classes of Year 3/4
- 1 Class of Year 5
- 1 Class of Year 6

You will notice this is the same structure as 2024 and we will include a new Mid-Year Reception class starting at the beginning of term 3. Classes for next year will also be situated in the same current locations as 2024, now that we have completed the current stage of our capital works.

Class Placements

We are currently working on class placements for next year. Placing all our students each year is a process that takes leadership and teachers many hours, many discussions as well as a great deal of thought and consideration. Many factors contribute to the placement. These include; gender balance, learning abilities, peer friendships, student combinations, class size, social and academic strengths and challenges. When making class placements we always consider the individual child while recognising that each child is also part of a complex process.

With each child at the centre of our process, our goal is to create an optimal learning environment for all students that meets their needs. In a small school, this can create additional complexities and challenges.

We respectfully ask that parents do not ask or request particular teachers for their child, as there are far too many factors to be considered when constructing a class for teachers to accommodate such requests. As this takes most of the term to deliberate, we ask that families trust and respect the process as changes are rare, knowing that teachers and leaders are collaborating and discussing each student and looking at what is the best fit for them.

A common question that parents ask is - *How can you help my child during this process?* Families can help by supporting the informed decisions of the staff and ensuring all conversations with children are positive and encouraging.

Class placements will be communicated to families on the final Tuesday of Term 4, as the students will meet their new teacher(s) and

classmates at a transition session on this day. Students will receive a letter that afternoon informing them of their class teacher(s), the name of their class and the room number. We trust this will be a very exciting and positive experience for all students as they prepare for another exciting year of learning in 2025. Thank you for your continued positive support in this matter.

Staffing News - staff retirements

At the end of this year we say a fond farewell to three of our valued staff who have decided to retire.

Glenda Barone, our School Secretary, has worked in the front office for 17 years. She has seen many changes in her admin role during this time and has been a first point of contact for our families, caring & supporting many students through their injuries and illnesses. Glenda is looking forward to spending more time with her family, especially with her grandchildren.

Marie Syrette, one of our specialist Education Support Officers, has also worked at Tranmere for 17 years. Marie has helped and supported numerous students with their learning throughout that time and also ran our successful Joeys Playgroup for a number of years.

Kathryn Beilby, our Librarian, has also decided to retire. Her love of reading has exuded through all her interactions with our students, staff and families and we are grateful to her for transforming our library into the marvellous space that we see now.

Year 6 Camp 2024

The following two articles are written by three Year 6 students reflecting on their recent Camp Experience in two very different perspectives. Enjoy the read:

On our way back in the kayaks, we stopped to make a raft. Two people were chosen to stand up in their kayaks and run along the front and back of the kayaks in a race. It was tricky for some people but others made it look really easy. Miss Cotter had to race against Oliver H and they both fell in twice. We all thought that was hilarious. After the races, we paddled back to shore and had lunch before getting back on the bus and heading back to school. The bus on the way home was very quiet, everyone was so tired but so happy to have had such a wonderful camp.

Diary Of A Convict Girl On Camp

Dear mother,

I miss you soc much since I haven't seen you for the last three year or so. I was sent to this far away place called Willow Creek for three hard, long days. We were force into the large, cold water. I drowned multiple times but still managed to keep in pushing for my survival. They then made us jog around the whole beach making us participate in difficult activities. When we got to the camp site, I had to unpack the little items we had. To stay clean, I had to bathe in freezing cold water. The food was plain and nasty and nearly inedible. Once I was changed into my pyjamas, they made me, and my fellow convicts do a quiz for survival. If you failed to answer the correct answer you would be sent to jail... and jail is not very good. Once the quiz was finished, we were sent back to our old, damp cells where I will have to sleep in. I must regain energy with the strong power of rest and will write to you tomorrow.

Day two 14th of November.

Dear mother,

It is the second day of camp, and I had to endure another, day of awful activities. I first awoke to the sound of screaming children in my dorms. My dormmates and I got dressed into prison outfits and left to get our morning meal. The meal was burned toast and tasteless butter and jam. After we ate, we were forced to ride tall and daunting bicycles. If you couldn't ride a bicycle... YOU WOULD GET RUN OVER BY ONE. Thankfully I could ride a bike but not up the tall hill. After I rode for 7 hours, I was forced to consume more terrible food, which contained expired meat with deceased bread and vegetables. I was then forced to walk up a gruelling mountain, which was 500 kilometres high. The mountain was covered in poisonous biting flies and sharp rocks. When my peers and I reached the top of the mountain, we had to build titanic boats out of natural recourses, to travel along a river. We rode them but sank into the freezing cold water. When the group and I walked back down the mountain, which caused us to fall multiple times, we finally arrived at the campsite. To try and escape the camp, we had to build automobiles. I did not manage to escape the camp, but instead, had to race with the other prisoners. They let us have some time to regain our health in our cells and clean up for dinner. The dinner foo was awful, I had to gobble uncooked meat and overdue vegetables. Before the prisoners and I were allowed to sleep, we had to watch a 5-hour movie about paint drying. Once I finally managed to get into bed, I was confronted with bug and roaches. I must sleep in this uncomfortable bed one more time, but then after that, I will finally see you again!


Day three 15th of November.

Dear mother, I cannot even comprehend my excitement to finally be able to see you again. But before I can see you again, I must go through yet another devastating day. My dormmates and I were forced to wake up at five AM to the sound of more screaming children. When I arrived at the dinner hall, I had to eat more expired bread and disgusting jams. We had to pack our things and remove our things from the campsite within 7.843927358195338429843853486 minutes. Because some hostages did not pack their things in time, they had to leave without them. I then entered a cramped bus with no air conditioning. Driving to the river was a long and hard journey, with many ups and downs. When I arrived at the river, I had no experience but was still forced to mount the kayak. I rode on the kayak for 1000 kilometres and rode back to the shore. Once my jail mates and I arrived at the shore we had to make food out of sticks, dirt, grass and leaves. They threatened to leave us behind while we were changing out of our wet clothes, so we had to change very quickly. When I got onto the bus with the rest of the group, I had to go through a long and gruelling bus ride. We had to watch a boring movie a bout tree growing and leaves falling on the way to see you. I am very excited to see you and cannot wait.

How to Volunteer in our School

Information for Volunteering - Due to changes in the Child Protection Act

At St Joseph's School Tranmere, we are always grateful for the support given by our volunteers. Volunteering applies to a wide range of activities in the school including attending excursions, coaching sports teams, reading in the classroom, helping in the many committees and many other school-related activities.

If you would like to act as a volunteer in the school, you are required to have a 6-point check. Please provide the school with copies of the following:

- Completed CESA Volunteer Registration pack available from the school office
- A Catholic Police Check Clearance or Working With Children Check (WWCC from the Department of Human Services (if you need to obtain this clearance please come to the school office)
- A RRHAN-EC (Responding to Harm, Abuse and Neglect in Education and Care) training Certificate
- · Work Health and Safety on-line Induction for Volunteers Certificate
- Work Health and Safety signed form
- COVID Status Certification

Please note: that all these processes are mandatory and must be completed in order to volunteer/continue to volunteer. This requirement is designed to ensure our children are protected and safe at school.


